Now he has graduated from McClatchy and is headed to Carnegie Mellon University to pursue a degree in architecture. I've gotten pinched, poked, and high-fived by Bill. I've seen book dealers

trade in their lists of book prices to scanners connected to Amazon. I've seen a dozen people scrambling during the Ice Cream Social for scoops, for bowls, for spoons, for the latest Harry Potter book. Some people here know me just as well as my good friends, because they are my good friends! I've gotten so much out of this library and there is no way I can thank the people who make it better every day (or every other month). Without this library, without this community, without this consistent anchor in my life for 18 years, it is an understatement to say my childhood, my upbringing, my development as a human, would have been different. I can't thank you all enough.

## Elk Grove Friends and Mayor Davis Team Up to Share Technology with the Library!

The Elk Grove Friends recently partnered with Elk Grove Mayor Gary Davis to provide new technology for the Elk Grove Library. Their goals were threefold:

1. Provide the library with iPads that can be mounted at child height to be used (in library only) by toddlers and preschoolers and their parents to promote early childhood literacy

2. Provide Google Chrome Books (laptops) for the teen area
3. Provide a display screen for the front area of the library

In addition, the plan included funds for improved wiring and a fund for future upgrades and maintenance of the equipment. Together, the Friends and Mayor were able to use innovative

means to raise the funds for the project. By using the crowdsource website Citizinvestor, they were able to raise funds online, which the Friends matched, to purchase the iPads. The Friends paid for the remainder of the project.

Crowdsourcing is a relatively new method of fundraising. Groups can post a description of their project online (in this case, on the Citizinvestor website) and ask for donations to fund the project. The website processes the donations and sends a check to the successful fundraisers. When a donor makes a donation on a crowdsourcing site, they are actually making a pledge—their credit card is not charged until the project's fundraising goals have been fully met.

"The Elk Grove Friends proved to be a perfect partner in raising funds for early literacy development," said Mayor Gary Davis. "I look forward to taking on even

bigger projects together.”

Jeff Rubin of the Elk Grove Friends emphasized the importance of the Mayor’s involvement. Mayor Gary Davis is interested in education and in building a trained, educated work force in the growing Elk Grove area. He is also a member of the Sacramento Public Library Authority Board. Both Jeff Rubin and Elk Grove Friends President Rick Mercer mentioned the importance of keeping libraries technologically up to date. Rick said, “The library has already provided twenty-five desktops for the community. They are important, but we needed to be able to reach out to teens, toddlers, and their parents with more current products that people might not be able to buy but do want to use.”

### Raley’s “NickelAid” Program Supports Summer Reading in 2014!

Raley’s Family of Fine Stores will be donating up to \$100,000 to California Libraries to help fund summer reading programs in 2014. This generous donation is a result of the “NickelAid” program. Every time you use a reusable bag (or reuse a paper bag) at Raley’s they will donate five cents per bag to a charity. During a recent contest on Raley’s Facebook page, consumers had the opportunity to vote daily for one of four nonprofit organizations. Raley’s said nearly 50% of voters chose to support public libraries. This year, Summer Reading garnered the most votes, showing the effectiveness of using social media as a fundraising tool!

## Advocacy Update: Gearing Up for Assessment Renewal

We have great news! Poll respondents in the City of Sacramento love the Sacramento Public Library. In addition, more than two-thirds of them are willing to renew the special assessment for Library services at its current amount. The assessment, which provides a significant amount of funding for city branches, is due for renewal. The challenge lies in persuading voters to approve a higher amount so that the Library can sustain funding to operate at current levels. During the next few weeks, the Friends and Foundation will work together with other community members to determine the best strategy for 2014.

We have a lot to think about. We need to increase awareness to help people see the value of the services our Library offers and how critical they are to our communities. Whatever measure is eventually put before the voters, whether it be a renewal, augmentation or increase, it will require the support of everyone involved to pass it.

Friends and Foundation coalition leaders Mary Ellen Shay and Pauline Grenbeaux will continue to review numbers, assess options, and talk with the Library administration and city representatives about what is possible and what the risks are. ## Book Den Internet Sales Expand to eBay and ABEbooks

Book Den Internet sales have been expanding. With a store on Amazon containing over 1300 book listings and growing, stores on eBay and ABEbooks were added in July.

The Amazon store lists all types of books, audio books and more. It has been functioning for about four years.

The eBay store will list sets of books, records, comics, some individual books and anything else that we have to sell. Items are sold by auction and for a fixed price. Volunteers who work on this site have to understand how to value and sell many different types of items.

ABEbooks will list foreign language books. Books listed on ABEbooks automatically get listed on sites in Spain, France, Italy, Germany and the UK. Most volunteers who work on this site speak foreign languages. They research the historical and






[The Mitten](#) by Jan Brett






[Abel's Island](#) by William Steig
